We have asked a lot of you regarding the additional guidance for keeping school safe and I wanted to say thank you again for all that you have done. By working together we can continue to avoid disruption and keep our children in school.

As you no doubt know, I am very COVID aware and try to read widely about the subject so that I can keep everyone safe. Research from the last two weeks, unsurprisingly, shows an increase in the number of positive cases in children aged between 4 and 15. With schools

going back and with secondary age pupils subject to more testing, this was always going to be the case, but it is still worth bearing in mind that we need to continue to be vigilant. On Monday, unless something significant happens, the next phase of the relaxation of measures will come into place. I am sure you are all looking forward to this as it means that there is an opportunity to see family again – I have a 3 month old niece who I am yet to meet!

In addition, from 12<sup>th</sup> April, which will still be in the Easter holidays, there are further restrictions to be lifted. Again, this is very exciting news and hopefully paves the way for a return to a more normal way of living.

I would ask that, as you have been throughout the pandemic, you are respectful of these guidelines and continue to follow them so that we can all continue moving forwards. Staying safe, not taking undue risks or breaching the rules will continue to enable schools to remain open and avoid the words that no one wants to read – your child's bubble has been closed!

Signor Marconi is here conducting the trials and is very satisfied with the results."
